HISTORY

Let's see now ... where to start. Sherman, set the "way-back machine" for early 1985, Dryden, NY. The scene: a dark, moist, re-upholstered dungeon that had been converted into a modest recording studio by Lee. It was here that it all began. Early one fateful afternoon in March of that year Jim Lawrence was called in by former Choice co-member Mark Joyce to do a few bass lines for some of Mark's songs. As the session progressed, an idea began germinating for further musical activity among the three; specifically, forming a band. Not unlike the humble genesis of all great organizations. a strong nucleus was in place. The search was now on for further compatible musicians to complete the line-up. Soon thereafter Mark brought in a vocalist friend, Allan Ploth, who, coincidently, had also recently performed for Mark's recording session in Lee's basement. Meanwhile, Lee contacted his childhood friend Steve Edgar to handle lead guitar duties. With the line-up completed, our young, ambitious, sonic adventure proceded with a vigor and determination, with a host of four songwriters aboard, to pen two sets (a scientific term for approx. 24 songs) of material into existence before receiving their first paying gig (emphasis on the word paying!). A master brainstorming session was then called to determine a suitable name. After what seemed hours, Masters Of The Obvious was agreed upon. This organization lasted exactly one gig before disbanding (literally) to pursue individual musical interests. Mark and Allan went on to form The Shambles, an all-original format. Jim, Lee

and Steve stuck together, under a mix of cover and original tunes, and The Kinetics was born.

(Steve came up with the name)

The first couple of months were spent seeking replacement parts (i.e. lead vocalist and drummer), but after endless disappointing and nerve-racking auditions it was decided, in a desperate attempt to get the band out of the basement and onto the stage, that Jim and Steve would share the lead vocal duties while Lee was responsible for programming his Yamaha RX-11 drum computer (fondly dubbed "Rex") to handle the percussion. Finally, a couple months later, although it seemed like years, The Kinetics burst out onto the Central NY music scene in early 1986. To their own suprise, the normally reserved local crowds were very enthusiastic towards the concept of a drum machine in a live situation. Everything was coming up roses until

Our heroes had no insight into the cruel trick fate had in store for them. Steve, juggling the band, a demanding full-time job, and a hyperactive cycling schedule (a sponsered team racer), found his hectic and often sleepless lifestyle was in need of drastic stress-reduction and announced his departure in late

1986.

SCENE 2: Enter stage right - Stephanie Pitsas on guitar, only to leave 4 months later to join up with The Shambles. The hunt was on yet again for a guitarist with lead vocal capabilties - a rare

beast found only in remote regions of southern Peru, during the dry season.

SCENE 3: However, a sudden referral from Stephanie landed the much sought-after creature in the name of **Chris Koch**. A shy, timid native Ithacan with incomparable natural ability. Soon thereafter Chris persuaded his 2 co-members that a suitable Rex replacement was available for a limited

time only (operators standing by). Which bring us to

SCENE 4: Please give a warm round of applause for **Dana** (Turbo) **Alling** on drums. (Farewell Rex. We miss ye.) Another native Ithacan with previous band experience with Chris. The newly evolved, improved and highly erotic **Kinetics** played from Aug. 1987 to Dec. 1988, including opening (and freezing) for **The Del Fuegos** in an April outdoor concert, and a sold out solo Kinetics concert at Cornell University. Sadly, Chris left the band in, you guessed it, Dec. of 1988 to pursue other musical interests in NYC. Which brings us to the latest rung in **The Kinetics** evolutionary ladder

SCENE 5: Softly lit white smoke billows from beneath the floor as she removes her ...Ooops! Wrong story. Anyway, as fate would have it, with the recent disbanding of **The Shambles**, it was another stroke of luck (or possibly lack thereof) and sheer violent persuation that procured the talents of **Allan Ploth** on lead vocals and rhythm guitar. And the ever-feared auditions for lead guitarist actually produced an exeptional player in the persona of **John Yates**, from Cinncinati. A final sigh of relief is heard from the founding members as **The Kinetics** have once again survived certain disaster on the rocks of despair to rally into an even more frightening musical form.

And there you have it, trivia buffs. Hope we haven't needlessly bored anyone out of existence.
